According to psychoanalytic theory, we repress aspects of ourselves and others which we are unable to confront and accept. Ancient primitive cultures who worshipped the female principle of the Great Goddess provide aspects of women that our patriarchal christian culture represses, i.e. marginalizes, outlaws or denies. *Siren* is a search for visual representation of this repressed female energy and power, the shadow of the Virgin Mary.

This installation has a traditional format of guardians — four Demons — and attendants — twelve Sirens — flanking a central throne. Historically the Goddess is often represented by a bird or seat — the Primordial Lap. The Winged Throne depicted here is therefore a site of original female power and the whole piece posits an opportunity to behold and confront a primal force.

Note: The images in this issue present the four Demons and the twelve Sirens; the triptych of the central throne has not yet been photo-documented.
