The workshop will be held at the Nathan Mayhew Seminars Building and the Tisbury School, both in Vineyard Haven, Massachusetts. During leisure hours, sunning, swimming, sailing, golf, tennis and fishing can help make summer life enjoyable. Nearby are Chappaquiddick, the old whaling port of Edgartown, the gingerbread houses and honky-tonks of Oak Bluffs, and island landmarks such as the Chicama Vineyards, the Windpower Museum, and James Taylor's and Carly Simon's nightspot, The Hot Tin Roof.

Sessions Include

Appealing to both high school and college teachers, the workshop includes working with graphics and layout, writing instructions, and brainstorming and devising research strategies for technical reports. Peer editing and testing, and group writing and revision are integral to the course. All working sessions will provide ideas for assignments and course design, and will provide the opportunity to address problems such as the non-native speaker as a technical writing student. Hands-on work with TRS-80 microcomputers will augment the sessions, providing valuable experience for teachers of computer literate students.

TEACHING TECHNICAL AND PROFESSIONAL COMMUNICATION: An Introduction to Teaching Written Communication for Engineers. Scientists, and Other Professionals The University of Michigan, August 1-5, 1983
