In the Spring issue, we included two papers from the CATTW conference in Montreal. Here we offer six more conference presentations; largely unabridged, these discussions provide the reader virtually with a transcript of proceedings, for they reflect both the presentation styles of the speakers and the collegial atmosphere of the May meeting. More importantly, they help us to know more about the activities and concerns of teachers in our field in Canada.

The final essay in this issue was not presented at the conference; in it, Elizabeth Shore describes the writer's role in the federal government.

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
